Ladies and Gentlemen,

Regatta Notices # 36 and # 36S are incorporated into this Regatta Notice # 54. The Event Anti-doping Rules issued on 9 April 2006 remain in effect and are attached, as well as the Crew Member Registration Form.

At present, we are in an Out-of-Competition ("OOC") period of the Event. OOC testing will continue until the start of the next In-Competition period in April 2007.

In an effort to streamline the procedures if an Anti-doping test is to be conducted, either now or during the competitions next year, I am requesting the following from you.

1. Anti-doping Procedure (refer to attached Procedure)

Please send me a list of 3 or 4 team staff at your base that may be available to assist in the event there is a visit by an Anti-doping Doping Control Officer ("DCO").

Send me the list by Email and I will forward it to ISAF and Anti-doping Norway.

2. Doping Control Station(s)

Beginning in March 2007, an Event Doping Control Station (similar to the one used in 2006) will be open near the AC Management office for the duration of the Event.

However, after consultation with ISAF and Competitors, and in an effort to provide less disruptive service to all concerned, we have agreed that, if you desire it, Anti-doping testing **may** be conducted at your Valencia base under the following conditions.

- a. You have an existing facility within your base (the "on-base" facility) that meets the minimum WADA standards as a Doping Control Station as set out in Appendix 2 to the Event Anti-doping Rules (extract attached);
- b. The facility must be available on very short notice if an Anti-doping test is to be conducted;
- c. The facility must be "off-limits" to all other uses or personnel while testing is being conducted; and
- d. The facility might not be used, if the DCO finds that the facility does not meet the minimum standards, including cleanliness.

If you wish to consider this option and you believe you have such a facility available at your Valencia base, I will be available to inspect it after 8 January 2007.

You are under no obligation to provide a facility at your base. In that case, as in the past, any of your crew members to be tested will continue to be taken to the Event Doping Control Station for testing.

3. Reminders

- A. The 2007 WADA Prohibited List will go into effect on 1 January 2007, and can be found at the WADA Website: <http://www.wada-ama.org/en/prohibitedlist.ch2>.
- B. Please remember that during Out-of-Competition periods, testing can be conducted anywhere that a crew member has given as his/her location for that date, e.g. at home, at your base in Valencia, or your training base elsewhere in the world.
- C. In-Competition testing will begin with Valencia Louis Vuitton Act 13 in April 2007; and will continue throughout the competition period(s) for each team. All other times will be OOC periods until the start of the Match.
- D. Remind your crew members to keep their location information current using the ADAMS website system. A 2-hour time slot location for each day is sufficient, but just saying "in Valencia" or "in London" is not adequate.
- E. Keep your Crew Registrations up to date. Be sure to add new crew members as they join your team, and to remove any registered crew member who is no longer with the team.
- F. Finally, a reminder that in 2007, Anti-doping testing for the 32nd America's Cup will end for crew members of each team when that team is no longer competing in the Regatta. At that time, crew members of those teams should de-register for the purposes of America's Cup Anti-doping testing. However, for some crew members it may be necessary for them to continue their location information on the ADAMS website because of their involvement with Olympic campaigns or other sailing events.

32nd AMERICA'S CUP

PROCEDURE FOR DOPING CONTROL AT TEAM BASES IN VALENCIA

1. Each Competitor must identify to the Regatta Director a minimum of 3 people ("Coordinators") who are normally at its Valencia base who can assist a Doping Control Officer (DCO) when they arrive to carry out testing. These Coordinators should be listed in order of priority.
2. When the DCO arrives at the base, the DCO will go to the Security or Reception Desk, and ask for the first Coordinator on the list; if that person is not available, then the DCO will ask for the second Coordinator; and so on.
3. The Coordinator will meet the DCO at the Security or Reception Desk. The DCO will identify him/herself and show the various accreditations (photo ID from Anti-Doping Norway and Letter of Authorization from ISAF). The DCO may have a doping control assistant with them.
4. If the Competitor is providing an "on-base" Doping Control facility, the Coordinator will take the DCO to inspect this facility. The DCO will inspect the facility to make sure it is of adequate standard.
5. The Coordinator will then accompany the DCO to the dock area to meet the yacht. As crew members disembark, the Coordinator will identify each person by calling out his/her name.
6. Only then will the DCO identify the crew member(s) to be tested. Once identified, the crew member may request that another person is present as their personal representative, and an interpreter, if needed.
7. If testing is to be done at the "on-base" Doping Control facility, the Coordinator will accompany the DCO and the crew members(s) to the "on-base" facility where the Doping Control tests will take place.
8. If testing will take place at the Event Doping Control Station, the DCO and crew member(s) will leave the base and proceed to the Doping Control Station.

Extract of Appendix 2 of the Event Anti-doping Rules:

Ref.	Item	Criteria
6.2c) 6.3.2	<p>The ADO shall ensure that the Doping Control Station meets the minimum criteria prescribed in 6.3.2.</p> <p>The DCO shall use a Doping Control Station which, as a minimum, ensures the Competitor's Crew Member's privacy and is used solely as a Doping Control Station for the duration of the Sample Collection Session.</p>	<p>Subject to local circumstances, the following should be provided as a minimum for a 32nd America's Cup Competition Venue Doping Control Station:</p> <p>The Doping Control Station should consist of a Waiting Area, one or more Processing Rooms and one or more toilets. All spaces should be contained in the one enclosed lockable Station.</p> <p>The "Waiting Room" should contain a check-in desk at the entrance, a refrigerator or other form of cooling for sealed drinks, enough chairs for the peak time load of the Station, and a television.</p> <p>The "Processing Room/s" (the number required will depend on the number of Competitor's Crew Members at the peak-time) should each contain a table, 5 chairs, a lockable refrigerator and a hazard waste bin.</p> <p>The Toilet should be large enough for 2 people and enable the witness to directly observe the passing of the urine Sample.</p>
